It turned out if you hold a certificate i.e. A or B etc, pre 2020 then you still don't need to do the RCC and a Flyer ID should be issued in due course. If you don't and your Flyer ID is expiring you need to do another test. I queried this with the BMFA and we sorted it as above. It does seem however that next time around it is expected that the BMFA achievements will count as nowt for the CAA, reverting to their status as a personal goal. So everyone will have to do the online Flyer ID test (RCC). It is not difficult just another CAA pain in the arse.
