Lets hope for an all round improvement soon.

On a positive note we have a member who has rejoined us having left a couple of years ago, welcome back Matt Carlton. We also have two new members, Paul Bowyer and Russell Curtis. I am sure you will make them welcome when you see them and help them to adjust and settle in. Matt and Paul are both fine to fly solo, Russell still requires a familiarisation with the field and our methods. He is a heli enthusiast so is under the guidance of Peter and Vanessa for now.

Our Solar controller finally gave up on us earlier this year, not too bad a return I suppose it has served us continually for about eight years or so. It has been replaced by a new one so we have

12V charging again as well as the mains option. The new 12V system has the facility to charge phones as well.

Whilst on maintenance, the model runway recently looked like it had been through a bombing strafe. It is the time of year where the birds, mainly Crows I believe, come to feed on the leather jackets and they have decimated some parts of the runway and the helipad with holes a good few inches deep. We also have the return of the dreaded moles. There is plenty of soil available on the edges of the adjacent fields or from the mole hills. Just remember it is your undercarriage and model at risk! :)

If you have been into the caravan lately you will hopefully have noticed that the build up of old magazines has gone and a lot of rubbish removed. One of our members who has recently moved to pastures new asked if he could have the magazines as he is spending a lot of time at home with an ill family member and wants something to read. We were happy to oblige and they have gone to a good home.

We have decided that as we were having a clear out there were some items we no longer use as a club as our path and methods have changed to match the times. We have decided to sell the generator, it does run but needs servicing, £330 new inc p+p, sold for £100. This is obsolete now that we have the mains hook up and as a result it has not been used for several years. We will also be selling the club trainer planes, the Bixler 2 £95 new, selling for £50, this will go to any new member student who may be interested. After the sale of the Bixler 2 we are left with the Bixler 1.1 which was given to the club in remembrance of Bob Whitbread. This will be retained in memory of Bob and will be used for students of choice to reach solo and then passed to the next until it's demise. I am sure Bob and all would agree with this course. The two Hitec radio's, the Aurora 9 and the Optic 6 Sport are now advertised for sale on our website.

One of the starting benches collapsed when moving it to allow grass cutting, on evaluation it was found a lot of the wood had rotted and it really was past repair. It has been removed from service and chopped up and has gone for a Viking funeral. A couple of the other benches are going the

same way. We have been given a picnic bench by Kevin as they have replace theirs up at the cafe with some nice new ones. This is in place we just need to work out the siting and if we are keeping both of the old ones. They could do with cleaning up and painting if we decide to keep them. Besides the bench collapse the two tables, the solar one and the work bench have both reached the end of their life and are deteriorating rapidly now. We are still on the lookout for two tables to replace them.

The Binham events are still on for this year. There are four booked. Details can be found on the club website events page. The format has changed, there is now a charge of £5 per day to fly. Sadly I could not get away for the first one of the year and no one took any pictures. Fingers crossed for the rest of the year.

It appears that Spektrum have introduced a feature to their computerised radios, the iX and NX series which gives telemetry for RSSI (Received Signal Strength Indicator). This gives you a percentage display and warnings and when it first happens it is very disconcerting. Believe me it is. I took off to do a normal circuit for a maiden on a new model, as I headed out across the full size runway I started to get warning of signal strength 12% followed by reducing percentages as I headed further away. This caused the brain to initiate a sphincter response and a yell of 'Shit' as it hit 2%, followed by an immediate return to our runway and a safe landing to breathe again. The initial range check had not shown any error messages but a subsequent one did. Apparently the first should have as well I am told. Anyway I tried another receiver and got the same result. So it was meant and was normal it seems. After numerous web searches and phone calls to dealers it seems that the percentage readouts are not problematic. Perhaps this is still experimental, but to me as a layman a reducing percentage signal strength should indicate a problem. If it isn't and it doesn't them what the hell is it doing there? The bottom line is currently - just ignore it! Still a worrying feature. It seems you can go into the system menu and change the setting from RSSI to dBm. You will need to read up on this and see if it makes any difference. I have changed the setting on my ix12 but as yet have not had a chance to fly and test it out.

I think that's all folks, keep flying them as if you stole them and enjoy the flying not pondering the crap the CAA keep on proliferating. :)



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
